Welcome to the Hawthorns Primary School Governors' Newsletter 2016.

It has been another excellent year at The Hawthorns School with a broad range of learning and development opportunities for all our pupils, of whom we should be very proud!

As we approach the end of the year though, the school budget continues to occupy our thoughts. Wokingham remains one of the lowest funded Local Authorities in the country, and we have again submitted a deficit budget this year. There is no certainty that our funding will improve, and it is vitally important that we control costs. As parents and carers you can help here by ensuring for example that school trip payments are not missed if at all possible. Schools cannot insist upon payment for trips which are part of the curriculum delivery, which is why the accompanying letter for trips always asks for donations. Quite correctly, no child should be excluded from one of these trips due to an inability to pay.



However, the school does not have the financial resources to significantly subsidise school trips and while none of us wants to see pupils miss out due to a cancellation, we do need costs to be covered in order for the trips to go ahead.

Another way in which you can, and do, help tremendously is in the support of PTA events. This is an increasingly important source of income which the school greatly appreciates. Thank you for your continued support. Thank you too to the PTA officers and many helpers who make these events possible.



You will have heard the Secretary of State for Education announce that all schools must convert to academy status, and heard her subsequently reverse that decision. The government does still expect that all schools will become academies. Local Authority (LA) funding is being squeezed, leaving the LA less able to support maintained schools, leading those schools to consider academy conversion. Each time a school converts to academy status the LA loses further funding, and eventually a tipping point will be reached at which the LA can no longer support the remaining maintained schools. These schools will then have no choice but to become an academy.

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In order to realise all the advantages of academy status, smaller schools including the majority of primary schools will need to join with other academies within a Multi Academy Trust. There is flexibility about how this is done in practice, with options to retain local governing bodies and to delegate varying levels of responsibilities to them. Schools often wish to retain their individuality whilst gaining benefit from closer working and collaboration with other schools within the trust. Work will take place this year within the Hawthorns governing body and in cooperation with other schools to determine the best model and the best partners for this school. We will also consult the wider school community on this matter.

Two of our long standing higher level teaching assistants, Mrs Helen Helliwell and Mrs Fiona Fisher have left us in recent months, with our thanks and best wishes. Both of them will be well known to many current and ex-pupils, and a lot of those children will also have benefitted from the time Helen has spent at various sporting clubs and events with them.

I must also thank my fellow governors who give their time freely and generously to the school. Two of our number, Mr John Howarth and Mrs Doreen Murgatroyd will be leaving us at the end of this term. Thank you to you both. This does also mean we will have governor vacancies in September; information on becoming a governor is available on the school website.

Finally, we have had another successful year of high academic achievement and high quality all round education for our pupils. Thank you to you all as members of the school community. Whether you are staff, parent, carer, pupil, helper, leadership team, PTA officer, governor or any combination of the above you all have a role in making The Hawthorns School a safe happy place, where our children can belong, believe, achieve and grow!

The Committee ensures that the Schools Health and Safety Policy, with due regard to Wokingham Borough Council Guidelines and relevant regulations is implemented, this includes reviewing Risk Assessments each year and amending if necessary.

I think that all the staff within the school should be so proud of how good the school and grounds are looking. It is such a happy and safe environment for the children to grow and learn.

Twice a year I attend Wokingham Councils Health and Safety Forum. Here I get to meet with fellow Governors from other schools and listen to speakers who are experts in their field. I then report back to the Full Governing Body, so they too are up to date on any changes and briefed on specialised subjects.

As well as all the meetings I attend, I really enjoy spending time with the children on some of their trips and activities. To pick a few from this year.......

I accompanied Year 5 to Kennett Court in October, where the children handed out gifts of harvest boxes to the residents. It was a joy to watch.
